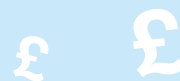


Why should I make a Will



By making a Will you decide who should inherit your estate in the event of your death.



1

If you do not have a Will then your estate (more simply your money, property and belongings) will pass in accordance with the Intestacy rules.

The Intestacy rules are defined in law and determine who will receive your estate in the event of your death. This means that the person closest to you may not inherit. For example, if you live with your partner but are not married, they would have no right to your assets under the Intestacy rules.

Even if you are married you need a Will.

If you are married the whole of your estate might not automatically pass to your husband or wife. If you own property or have young children then a Will can be vitally important.

Who will deal with your estate.

Your Will tells people who you want to deal with your estate in the event of your death. These people are called your executors. When making a Will you set out who should have your money, property and possessions when you die.



4

Make it easier for everyone.

If you make a Will it makes dealing with your estate and, for example, selling or transferring property much easier. This could mean that the beneficiaries are much less likely to fall out after your death.

5

Your personal circumstances may change.

If your personal circumstances change, for instance if you start to cohabit with a partner, marry, separate or divorce, or your wealth increases, then you will need to consider whether you need to write a new Will.
